Artisanal immersion

A truly unique experience of connection to self and ancient pottery. A shared journey where we walk together in the unfolding mystery of a new culture. It is by no means a retreat where everything is laid out for your comfort, but a walk together with an eye to uncover and breathe in the amazingness and beauty of difference as well as connection.

The structure of the week revolves around the **pottery workshop** instructed by Aïcha that is detailed below.

The rest of the day is open and intends to be very relaxed and focused on enjoying our time with the family and experiencing the stunning region. We find that integrating the spectacular environment, culture and land into our week makes the best afternoons; hiking or walking through the Rif Mountains, meeting other potters or artisans of the area, visiting the unique souk...




The schedule is open, we can switch things around once we are there according to the progress and preferences of the group.

The classes will take place at Aïcha's workshop during the morning, after breakfast.




Sitting on the floor on a sheepskin, we will dedicate the first, second and third morning to learn from Aïcha how to model the clay with our hands, with the only help of two flat discs made of clay to enable the rotation, and build the pieces according to the ancient techniques practised by the Female Rifian Potters.



Once the modeling is finished and the entire surface of the pot has been smoothed with a wooden spatula we are ready to start the burnishing on the fourth morning.

The burnishing is done by carefully rubbing the entire pot with a small limestone boulder to hide any defect and to tighten the surface.

On the fifth morning, we will apply coating to the pots with a soaked cloth preparing the surface of the pots to be decorated.



Our "brush" will be made from the tuft of hair from the back of a goat, and the natural pigments used to decorate our pieces from mixing both minerals and water.

That same evening, we will place our finished pottery on a bed of pine needles and firewood, we will then cover it with the natural fuel needed to cook our pieces from "cakes" made of cow dung, straw and olive pits.



We will wake up early the sixth morning to prepare a fire and our workspace for a few hours until the fuel is consumed, leaving the coal to cool until the next day.



We will then depart to visit
Ourtzagh's country souk, held weekly
for an opportunity to get in contact
with local people as they go about
their daily business.



A personal favorite outing; accompanying Aïcha and her donkey to collect the special clay that she works with from her surroundings.
